CTFB Produce Goals

- We have set aggressive goals for produce distribution, as we now have the warehouse capacity to handle significantly more.
- FY17 Goal: **16 million pounds** of produce distributed (37% of total distribution)
- Strategic Plan FY2020 Goal: 29.5 million pounds of produce distributed (50% of total distribution)

Total Produce Received






CTFB Produce Goals

- We cannot reach our goals and accomplish our mission without YOU!

Produce Distributed FY17 Oct-Mar






Produce Costs

- Not all produce is zero-cost
 - VAP (value added processing) fees: produce is technically donated, but there are costs associated with labor and packaging, typically around \$0.10/lb
 - Freight costs: vary based on location, from \$500 to \$3500 per truckload



Purchased vs. Donated Produce






Major Produce Sources

- VAP & Freight / Purchased:
 - Feeding Texas / other food banks
 - Feeding America / other food banks
 - Brokers/Vendors
- Donated:
 - Food rescue

48% of our total produce acquisition is through Feeding Texas





Feeding Texas: What We Do

- We're the network of 21 food banks in the state of Texas.
- Our function is to serve as a centralized desk to help food banks source produce at the lowest possible cost.
- FYTD2017: 28.4 million pounds; ~6 million/month



Feeding Texas & CTFB

- We source as much produce as we can and offer it to the food banks in two ways.
 - Mixing Center: Push-model
 - Direct Loads: food bank choice
- Bethany lets us know what she wants each week and we (try to) provide.
- CTFB is our second-largest receiver of produce in Texas.




Feeding Texas Produce Program

Vendor>Feeding Texas>CTFB>Agencies>Clients

- Work with surplus from other territories
- CTFB Average produce cost: \$0.09/lb
- CTFB Average Produce + Transportation: \$0.11/lb

Feeding Texas

- We deal primarily in "seconds."
 - These are cheaper than number 1's.
- We also take "rejections."
- We love zero-cost donations but these are more rare.



Feeding Texas Future

- We're working on a produce packet and one-pager for you to help your volunteer force.
- Our produce goal is 70 million pounds through our network.

 The distribution system ends halfway without all of you! Thank you for your hard work in getting quality food into the hands of the hungry.

Are you sure it's okay?

- Does the produce have an odor?
- When you cut it open, how does it look?
- Touch?
- Are there visible infestations?
- Is it completely rotten or moldy?



Q&A / Quality Control Tips

- Use ALL your senses when checking produce.
- Anything that makes produce ugly but not unsafe is okay!
 - Notches (cuts) in onions, potatoes, carrots
 - Mold in areas that <u>does not</u> affect quality
 - Discoloration
 - Wilting/spotting/scarring
